This June will be my 20th anniversary with my wife Wendy. Back in 2001, neither of us imagined many events that would unfold during these two decades, including the tragic death of her father a week before our wedding, leaving the Boston area where we started our family and moving to Michigan, learning to drive on dirt roads (we had plenty of potholes in Boston but no dirt roads!), having five wonderful children, having a small hobby farm that includes three donkeys, facing a pandemic and having a heart attack in 2020, and joining the Ann Arbor Christian community in 2009.

Before Wendy and I met, during her undergraduate years at the University of Michigan, she was in a small group during the start-up years of Knox Presbyterian Church in Ann Arbor. There, she met the school's first full-time and beloved principal, Ann Deckert, who was co-leading the group with her husband. During that same period nearly 800 miles away, I became a believer as an undergraduate at Harvard and decided that I wanted to pursue a career in education. A few years later, Wendy and I met at church when she moved to Boston to work on her Master's degree. Fast forward years later when we decided to move to Michigan, Wendy reconnected with Ann to talk about Ann Arbor Christian for our then three children, and that is how God started our journey with AACS.

In a season in which so much is still unknown and unexpected trials still face us on both near and global levels, stories like this remind us of God's intricate and intimate handiwork in working all things according to His greater plans: how He orchestrates relationships, events, and circumstances so that His kingdom, greater purposes, and love are advanced through every and all situations.

Between being forgetful and being insistent on our own wisdom, we often need these times to revisit our memories, to re-read accounts of God's faithfulness captured in Scripture, and to retell each other our own stories of God's transformative interventions in our lives. In both bountiful seasons and excruciating ones, God has plans for you and for AACS to prosper, as captured by the beautiful quilt in our Gathering Space.

Even while I write this, I trust that God is orchestrating the timing for the next leaders of AACS in ways that we do not even see yet, guiding the school board and me as we discuss the future of the school's capital campaign, sharpening our understanding of the word "prosper", and preparing the next generation of families who will attend Ann Arbor Christian.

With the status of COVID-19 still unpredictable, Wendy and I are struggling with where to go for our 20th anniversary in June. However, for this small decision and for the many bigger ones that will lie before us, we know that we can trust God for the future of our marriage, our five children, and our children's children. In this season of Lent, may the supernatural mystery of two contrasting forces at play - pain, brokenness, and suffering on one end and rejoicing, celebration, and hope on the other - allow us to be more deeply rooted in our God who orchestrates all things for those He loves. We can trust God for the future of Ann Arbor Christian and the thousands of lives within our school community today and tomorrow.

#### For Such a Time as This

Many of us are familiar with the Old Testament narrative of Queen Esther. Set in the Persian empire, this short but significant narrative chronicles the experience of God's people who were in Persia — not their promised land. After an enemy of the Jews (Haman) convinced the king to kill all the Jews, the Lord used Esther's cousin Mordecai to speak these often quoted words from Esther 4:14: "For if you remain silent at this time, relief and deliverance for the Jews will arise from another place, but you and your father's family will perish. And who knows but that you have come to royal position for such a time as this?"

# Putting on the Armor of God

As we have been unpacking our chapel theme for this year, there has been a buzz of excitement as the students anticipate which armor piece will be the focus of the next chapel. The elementary students receive their own paper version of the piece of armor. These are assembled on the outside of their lockers as a visual way to remember what they have learned. Recognizing the crafty lies of the enemy who would want us to question our identity in Christ, the truth of God's Word, and the sufficiency of Christ's death on the cross has been an ongoing focus. The middle school students have had some deep discussions about how these lies play out in their lives and how to combat those lies with God's truth.

These lessons are not a once and done kind of thing, but rather ones that need to be repeated over and over again. The truth of God's love for us brings great joy, yet we are often a forgetful people. Paul reminds his readers to be alert. The enemy is relentless in his lies. We need to be as determined in clothing ourselves daily in God's armor and helping our students to do the same.



What does that mean in a practical way for parents and teachers? How do we help our students to stand firm in a world that is shifting sand?

Pray.... Daily ask God to clothe your family, children, grandchildren, students, and teachers in the armor of God. Vigilance in prayer

**Proclaim...** Share your stories of faith, ways God has worked in your family, in your own life, in the lives of those you know. As children hear about both miraculous intervention and amazing perseverance under trial, they grow in seeing God's faithfulness and in developing resilience.

Recently as the fifth graders shared what they had learned from their Family Heritage Project, I was blessed as several students shared faith stories from their ancestors. I share them as a way to encourage you to pass on the stories of God's faithfulness to the next generation.



What does the "Armor of God" mean to you?:

"I believe it means we need to be ready for anything the world may throw at us and God gives us what we need to be ready in any situation or problem we may face."

#### Faith Story by David, 5th Grade

When my great-grandfather Bill was eight, he woke up and realized that his father was gone - his father had abandoned the family. This was during the time of the Great Depression. Not having a father made childhood very tough for him and he could have followed after poor influences. Later in life in WWII, Bill was enlisted in the war and assigned a special project where he was involved in the plan to create an atomic bomb. After his experience, he made a choice that rather than helping create products of destruction. he wanted to help people live a life of following God. Bill became a pastor and stayed one for over three decades, including being the pastor at First Baptist Church in Ypsilanti, Ml. That decision created the legacy of faith that my family has today.



#### • Faith Story by Andrew John, 5th Grade

My sister Jorie and I are named after our great-grandparents, John and Marjorie. In 1945, when my Grandpa Dale was four years old, my great-grandma Margie got a bad headache. Two days later, she was paralyzed and couldn't breathe by herself. She was diagnosed with polio and put in an iron lung to breathe for her. She was in the hospital for four years. She lived almost 40 years in her iron lung, and Grandpa John quit his job as a celery farmer to take care of her. The amazing thing about Grandma Margie is that she never complained, even though she never walked again. She trusted completely in God. She always prayed for other people and people loved to be around her because of her good attitude. Grandpa John and Grandma Margie loved each other and God, and they showed everyone in their family what it meant to trust in Jesus.

# Listening with the Ears of Our Hearts

Equipping Students to Become World Changers and Culture Makers for Jesus

"Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called children of God." — Matthew 5:9

On Monday, January 18th, the AACS students explored this verse in conjunction with our chapel theme relating to the armor of God and having our "feet fitted with the readiness that comes from the gospel of peace." (Ephesians 6:15). At a prior chapel, students explored the idea of peace with God through the redemptive work of Jesus Christ. Our Martin Luther King Day chapel built upon that concept, but extended it to explore what it means to be peacemakers with one another in our communities.

MLK Day as a day "on" rather than a day "off" has been a longstanding AACS tradition. When students stay home from school, there is probably very little they do to think about and respond to the life and legacy of

Martin Luther King, Jr. Attending a school day entirely devoted to exploring topics related to social justice and King's legacy to work to build a world where we are one in Christ demonstrates its importance to our students and equips them to become world changers and culture makers for Jesus.

Our world, broken by sin, is filled with places of division and separation. In recent events in our country, the division between races has been highlighted as an area where much work is still needed to build peace and break down walls of division. In praying about and preparing for this day, the committee of teachers who contributed to the day

felt it important to focus on starting with listening to others.

This was not only a lesson that students could grasp and apply, but also would serve as a foundational principle to live as peacemakers. If one is to be an active peacemaker, the first act needed is to listen to one another - and listen with the ears of our hearts. It is interesting that when we put two ears together, we form a heart, and that the word "ear" is inside the word "heart". It's not surprising then that really listening involves using one's heart to truly hear the other.

In our opening chapel, we explored the idea of listening as a form of peacemaking through a variety of skits performed and recorded by the 8th graders. Each skit illustrated a conflict and a solution. The students could see how listening was a key aspect of each resolution. This was followed by a lesson and activity where students in grades 3-8 practiced listen-

ing with the heart, as they listened to several video clips of people who had been impacted by acts of racial



injustice. We chose personal stories and testimonies of people who experienced acts of discrimination and violence in order to develop empathy and and the skill of listening with their hearts on a deeper level. Discussions following each video clip allowed students to process what they

heard and share the messages from each video. Students responded very well to the videos, taking each story very seriously and answering with thoughtful and caring responses. Our youngest students in preschool through second grade shared picture books at age appropriate levels, but could also practice listening with their hearts as they heard the stories. In both situations, the power of a story, of personal experience, really drew the students in and evoked a powerful response. "A person is a person, not a color" was one of the responses given by one of our second grade students. A middle school student

reflected on the experience in this way: "I heard the courage and faith of these people, that protested peacefully and did nothing wrong. These powerful stories should carry over into our lives, and we should all be united by faith rather than separated by hate." One young student may have summed it up most succinctly, "God made everyone and we need to show love."

Our goal is that students learn to listen with their hearts, in their own interpersonal conflicts on the playground, in the classroom, with their families and neighbors, and, as they grow, that God will use them to bring peace and reconciliation to the world.



Elementary students worked on their "listening with my heart" hats to help them connect that, when we listen, we need to engage more than just our ears, but also our hearts to truly understand and "hear" people as God does.


