

HEADS UP by Wayne Sit, Head of School Join Us During a Critical Season



The school had quite a gathering of rising 9th graders and their families at a social evening at the Upper Campus.

We are in what I would call one of the most historic seasons in the school's 30+ years of existence. This milestone moment is the launch of our high school in August 2023 with our first 9th grade class and the beginning of our journey to become the first Preschool-Grade 12 interdenominational Christian school in Ann Arbor.

Between this issue of the Beacon and the next one that will arrive at your home in late June, several critical months are before us, and we are calling on the entire AACS community to have the school on your minds and hearts.

Over the next few months, we could use your prayer and support for the high school in these specific areas:

• The recruitment of 50 ninth graders to join the pioneering first class, which includes several new ad campaigns on social media, digital billboards with targeted digital ads being pushed to vehicles that drive by them, and an email campaign. We do not need 50 students to open, but that is our goal.

 The hiring of new high school teachers and staff who are



passionate about our mission and our vision for a new Christian high school and love the uniqueness of high schoolers.

- Targeted efforts to raise an additional \$300,000 in designated funds for the start-up of the high school.
- Continued planning of curriculum, extracurricular programs, student life, spiritual formation, policies, transportation, and other key areas.
- Finding ways to maintain our identity as one school on two campuses.
- Protection in a season which we sense heightened spiritual attacks on the school community.

While many of these items will be ongoing tasks throughout the summer and into 2023-2024 school year, the next few months are important in making significant progress. The journey to launch our high school will be a marathon, not a sprint, but bursts of momentum can greatly help. As a result, we earnestly seek your financial support, active prayers, and telling others about God's expansion of Christian education at AACS. Please see p.2 for more ways to help.

In addition to launching the new high school, critical initiatives are also happening for our current campus, which is virtually at capacity with strong enrollment. Most significantly, this summer marks the installation of our new maker space and industrial kitchen. Contracts have been signed for the work to begin immediately after school gets out, specialized equipment has been ordered for delivery, and a schedule has been set to complete the work by early August.

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A COMMUNITY GATHERED MLK Day Reflection

On Monday, January 16th, the Ann Arbor Christian School community gathered to spend the morning "on" rather than "off" to reflect on the legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. This tradition of a day "on" has become one of the highlights of our AACS year.

Our chapel theme for the school year is "Created for a Purpose," through which we have reflected on the ways young people in Scripture stood up "in faith, in life, in love, and in purity" (1 Timothy 4:12). Inspired by this theme, our MLK celebration this year was focused on the peaceful and courageous role of young people involved in the civil rights movement.

We began the morning with worship as we joined as a community for chapel. Together, we reflected on the story of the boy, Samuel, from the Bible, and how God had placed him in the right place at the right time to serve Him in a difficult way.

After chapel, the school was divided into multi-age groupings. During this time, our youngest students learned about Ruby Bridges, who, at six years old, was the first black student integrated into a white school in Louisiana. She is the girl immortalized in the famous Norman Rockwell painting of her being escorted to school by U.S. Marshals who were there to protect her. Students were moved not just by her courage, but also by her daily prayer of forgiveness for those who opposed her. The third through fifth graders gathered to learn about the peaceful "Children's March" and were inspired by their bravery and determination. Finally, the middle schoolers learned about the disparity in the education systems in the south at that time, and the role and courage children had in integrating schools.

Our vision and prayer, as we came together to celebrate Martin Luther King Day, was that we all be salt and light in



our world as Jesus commanded, and that our students will be inspired to "Not let anyone look down on you because you are young

but set an example for the believers; in faith, in life, in love and in purity." (1 Timothy 4:12)

Don't let anyone Jook down on you because you are young, but set an example for the believers in speech, in conduct, in love, in faith and in purity. _______

BEYOND THE BASICS Service Learning

Ann Arbor Christian School's mission statement has a line that encapsulates our goal of developing students who will make a difference in the world by living and acting in society as committed followers of Jesus Christ. Such disciples are Kingdom builders, and one of the ways we nurture that goal is through regular service projects that enable students to make a difference in the world. This fall, we embarked on one of our larger scale service projects, the Multiplication Project. Staff members on the Multiplication Project selected Shepherd's Foundation, a charity that focuses on Christ-centered service to the people, especially children in Ukraine. Since the beginning of the war, Shepherd's Foundation has concentrated on supporting refugees and addressing the humanitarian crisis in their country.

This project allowed students to use their gifts and talents, offer those to the Lord and allow him to multiply those talents and use them to serve others. This project is modeled on the story of the Multiplication of the Loaves, which the students first explored in chapel. Students saw how a young boy offered what he had and allowed the Lord to use it for His purposes and glory. In this way, students were encouraged to think about what gifts and talents they have and use those to create a project or service that they could offer to the Lord. Students were given the opportunity to apply for "seed money" of \$5 or \$10 to fund their projects with \$535 of seed money invested in their work. They were sent with these words during a special commissioning ceremony held on Grandparents' Day:

The most famous commissioning is when Jesus commissioned his disciples saying "Go make disciples of all nations, baptizing themand lo l am with you always to the very end of the age. He blessed them as he sent them."

Today Jesus and AACS are commissioning you, we are sending you. Here the blessing Jesus wants to give you.

- Go use your talents to bring a blessing to others.
- Go knowing that you are not alone. Jesus is with you.
- Go knowing that with God all things are possible.

Another 30 students were commissioned as prayer partners in the project with these words, "You have the opportunity to be a prayer partner or a prayer warrior. Remember, Jesus first prayed to the Father before he did the miracle. So, we are depending on you to pray for the multipliers asking God to bless their "loaves and fish" their project and multiply it."

Students, with the help of their families, then embarked on the



challenge to carry out their projects. Finally, during the week of Dec. 19th, students began to bring in their projects and prepare for our craft fair. We were amazed by the creativity, diversity, and quality of projects made by the students. We had everything from handmade stress balls, an amazing assortment of baked goods, wood projects, handmade jewelry, jams and jellies, pickles, etc. Students loved sharing their talents and then



"shopping" the craft fair for Christmas gifts for families and friends. Additionally, older students served younger students as shopping buddies, helping them to select and make purchases.

Through the efforts of the students, the support of the families and the multiplying power of God, the investment was multiplied tenfold bringing in over \$5,200 in proceeds.

On March 3rd, AACS students "presented" our fund to Shepherd's Foundation and were able to be thanked via video by a representative form the Foundation to hear the impact that will be made through our contribution. We captured our students offering this gift and our prayers for the gift to continue its multiplication power in Ukraine in a video we shared back with the ministry.





Through projects such as this one, AACS fulfills our mission and key school learning goals of developing "faithful stewards" who use their resources to build God's kingdom and "willing servants" who put the needs of others before their own and give freely of their time and talents.

Science Fair

AACS scientists showed off their work at our annual Ann Arbor Christian School Science Fair on February 10. Fifty-eight projects were submitted, including projects that were both curricular requirements and voluntary projects - all showcasing a high level of curiosity and through scientific investigation better understanding the world God created. Students in third and seventh grade spent class time learning how to complete scientific investigation and develop a science fair project, which was largely completed at home. Both Mrs. Wiland, the middle school science teacher, and Mrs. Charlton, the third-grade teacher, were impressed with the quality of projects their students created.

In celebration of all things science, the students were treated to an assembly by the Michigan State University Science Theater, who performed several science demonstrations using physics principles. Students loved their show which increased the excitement in science. Additionally, we were blessed to gather as a school at our "Annual Soup Supper" to view the projects and celebrate the students' work. The soup supper has not been held since February 2020, so this year's gathering was extra special.

As a Christian School committed to academic excellence, developing a love and interest in science is one way we foster disciples who will "live and act in society as committed followers of Jesus Christ". As our students grow and use their gifts and talents, we expect to see future engineers, doctors, scientists and other leaders ready to impact the world in amazing ways...and it all starts with curiosity.

Mark Doorlag September 6, 1967 - December 22, 2021

Coming from Christian education himself, Mark attended



Kalamazoo Christian Schools for K-12 and then Calvin College in western Michigan. He was passionate about education centered on Jesus Christ. When he and his wife Leslie had their own children, he knew that he wanted them to attend Ann Arbor Christian School. In that spirit, the Mark Doorlag Memorial Fund was used to help fund the pioneering start of the AACS high school so that Christian education can have an even further reach in the community.

That I am not my own, but belong body and soul, in life and death to my faithful Savior Jesus Christ At AACS, Mark was known for many roles in addition to being a father of three students. Perhaps most visible to the community, he coached both boys' basketball and soccer for AACS, with a special love for soccer as the head coach for many years. He was a devoted classroom parent helper, always taking pictures on field trips, a carpool driver for 15 years, and known for the big ski trips that he organized for school families. He also came most mornings to get his coffee from the Gathering Space. Behind the scenes and most visible to the staff, Mark loved doing technology work for the school as the IT committee

chair. In this role, he spent most of his volunteer time - countless hours - helping to provide the technology resources that the teachers, staff, and students use every single day. He always wanted to help the teachers and often felt like part of the staff because he was onsite so regularly every week. He often rode his bicycle from downtown Ypsilanti to AACS in the evenings and on the weekends to work on technology. He had a servant's heart for AACS and those around him.

Lastly but most importantly, Mark loved the Lord, and that best manifested itself in how he loved his wife Leslie and his children Eva, Jack, and Cole. At his funeral, it was shared that this Question and Answer #1 from the Heidelberg Catechism was deeply on his mind and central to his final earthly words to his own children.
