Recently, I was alone at one of my favorite Chinese restaurants in Ann Arbor. After perusing the menu, I relayed my order to my server, who was familiar with me since I am somewhat of a regular. Typically, she would punch my order into her tablet as she has done many times before. However, this time around, she told me that I didn't really want to eat that dish and strongly recommended a more authentic one. I liked her choice and proceeded with it, but I was a bit taken aback by her boldness.

It made me think about the role of boldness behind a person's convictions. While my dinner order wasn't a life-or-death matter, my server felt strongly that there was a better choice and was not afraid to share her opinion with me. On a far greater scale, wouldn't it be amazing if Ann Arbor Christian School could play a key role, along with parents and churches, in equipping and shaping our students to see what's better, more beautiful, more



noble, more eternal, and more praiseworthy, and then to have the boldness to convey that to others?

In our mission to provide strong, Christ-centered education, one of our goals is to shape disciples and culture makers for Jesus Christ. Rather than being swept up in the waves of pleasant-sounding but hollow philosophies based on human wisdom, we seek to help nurture children and teenagers who are deeply rooted in Christ, crave patterns and habits that are based on God's good and perfect will, and are eager to share those convictions with others. Rather than allowing our culture to shape this discussion, we can help our students to grow in both love and truth as defined by His Word, to see how the two work together, and to be able to winsomely and boldly engage in that conversation through a biblical worldview.

With over 30 years of history under our belt, we are no longer a start-up school, but are well into our early adulthood. However, adulthood also presents its own sets of opportunities and challenges. to be that light for Christ in our community and to experience the successes and growth we have seen. Your giving will allow us to continue the momentum!



A Great Legacy for Us to Continue

Recently, the school recognized two people who, in different ways, had a significant and historical impact on Ann Arbor Christian School.

First, we celebrated the retirement of

Jan Musch, who served as the finance manager for nearly the entire life of the school. In addition to the critical and often behind-the-scenes work that she performed, Jan and her husband David

were among the founders of our school. They started planning and praying for the school in the 1980's and were financially



giving to the school before it even opened. Their generation blazed the trail and took the leap of faith that gave us Ann Arbor Christian School. Second, the

school's first full-time principal, Ann Deckert, visited recently both to attend Jan's retirement celebration and to see the new high school. For several years when the school was in modular units, she and Jan shared a small closet as their joint office. During the mid-1990's to 2003, her leadership guided the school through its initial seasons of growth. Additionally, Ann was instrumental in purchasing the property for the main campus and the construction of its building. During her visit, Ann was able to spend some time with the 9th graders, shared how they were the new generation of pioneers for the school, and offered them words of encouragement. In turn, one of the 9th graders spoke on behalf of his classmates to thank Ann for her role in laying the foundation for Ann Arbor Christian.

Psalm 78 says: *My people, hear my teaching; listen to the words of my mouth. I will open my mouth with a parable; I will utter hidden things, things from of old — things we have heard and known, things our ancestors have told us. We will not hide them from their descendants; we will tell the next generation the praiseworthy deeds of the Lord, his power, and the wonders he has done. He decreed statutes for Jacob and established the law*

in Israel, which he commanded our ancestors to teach their



children, so the next generation would know them, even the children yet to be born, and they in turn would tell their children. Then they would put their trust in God and would not forget his deeds but would keep his commands.

Both Jan and Ann were used by God over 30 years ago to help shape the school into what we have today, and the children at the school today were not even born yet! Doesn't that give you goosebumps? Our current students and those students in the future are the unborn generations mentioned in Psalm 78 above. That fact is both amazing and mind-blowing, but that's the kind of loving and all-orchestrating God we serve here at Ann Arbor Christian.

May the strong legacy of Christian education that people like Jan

and Ann began decades ago inspire the rest of us to join in and continue the good work that God has and will continue to do through Ann Arbor Christian. Every generation has its role in the life of our school today that will also have an eternal impact on the precious children yet to be born!



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BOARD UPDATE Important Mission of AACS

I was recently struck anew how important the mission of AACS is: In partnership with Christian families, Ann Arbor Christian School offers Christ-centered, academically excellent education that challenges students to live and act in society as committed followers of Jesus Christ. I've been thinking about that last part in particular, living and acting in society as committed followers of Jesus. With war breaking out in Israel, war continuing for over a year and a half in Ukraine, all the mental health challenges of our times, and not to mention an election year beginning soon, it can be so hard and yet is incredibly necessary to hold on to hope. Society desperately needs followers of Jesus who know how to persevere in hope since our ultimate hope is found beyond this world. If we can model, teach, and challenge all our children and students to keep coming back to Jesus for hope and then bringing that hope to the world, what a blessing that would be to our society!

The board has also been reviewing possible updates to the student handbook that are necessary with the addition of high school grades, tackling board items related to accreditation for the school, and we have completed our study of *Guiding Schools to Flourish* by Henry Contant and Edward Noot. In addition, the board will be working with Wayne Sit and the leadership team as we approach our re-accreditation in April and begin steps to update our longrange strategic plan.

AACS EAGLES! Successful Fall Season in Middle and High School Sports

Ann Arbor Christian School recently concluded a very busy and successful fall athletics season. Middle school teams participated in girls' volleyball, co-ed soccer, boys' flag football, and co-ed golf while high school teams participated in girls' volleyball, co-ed cross country and



girls' equestrian. Additionally, AACS partnered with Father Gabriel Richard High School for a co-op in boys' soccer and boys football. There were 70 middle school students, and 15 high school students who participated in a fall sport.

This year, AACS continued to have a strong presence in the league for the traditional sports that we offer, built on sports that started last year, and, with the addition of the high school, was able to kick start some new programs as well. The Middle School soccer team, coached by Sean Lindblade and Tom Gritter, took 2nd place in the WCA invitational and was



atop the standings throughout the regular season. The 7/8th grade volleyball team, coached by Lauralyn Bottom, took 1st place in the WCA Invitational Tournament, as well as 1st place in the A.A.I.A.A league tournament. The flag football team, coached by Ty Anderson and Mark Hake, completed an

undefeated season, going 10-0 on the year. The golf team, coached by Dustin Ferrell and Jim Warring, did not compete against other schools, but still had 8 golfers who came out for the team. Additionally, the 5/6th grade team, coached by Kim La Marca, had 16 girls participate, and finished 4th in the league tournament.

At the high school level, the girls volleyball team quickly established a reputation around the community as having a very strong and competitive program. The Eagles, coached by Isaac London and Jayme Higgins, went 12-8 overall on the inaugural season and took 2nd place in the WCA Invitational Tournament. For the first time ever, AACS hosted a cross country team, coached by Autumn Lytle, as well as an equestrian team that was coached by Abbie-Jo Wilcox. In addition, AACS was able to send two soccer players and two football players to join FGR in the co-op.

Lastly, AACS was also able to join the Michigan High School Athletic Association (MHSAA) and will be able to participate in post season tournaments starting next school year. Go Eagles!

BEYOND THE BASICS Measuring our Mission Through Accreditation

According to the Cambridge dictionary, accreditation is the fact of being officially recognized, accepted, or approved of. However, the accreditation process with Christian Schools International (CSI) is much more than that. CSI's accreditation not only provides the necessary stamp of approval, but also guides the school in a process to assess itself and create goals for improvement. Additionally, Christian distinctiveness is embedded into the accreditation indicators which allows Christian schools to assess themselves against their mission. This dovetails directly with Ann Arbor Christian School's philosophy that faith is not an add-on, but an integral part of everything we do.

The accreditation process for established schools such as AACS is called *Measuring the Mission*. The process begins with gathering data through stakeholder surveys including parents, staff, older students, and the board of directors. The next step is honestly assessing ourselves through an in-depth self study. The full staff gathered on October 12 and 13 to begin this process which involves discussion around specific indicators, rating the school's performance in each indicator ranging from "getting started" to "exemplary", and providing evidence to support the rating. Over the two days, the staff worked through 45 indicators in 3 main areas in addition to the office staff verifying compliance on organizational assurances, such as having documents, procedures, policies, and structures in place that meet state requirements as well ensuring that systems are in place which allow the school to function well so it can fulfill its mission. Staff members worked diligently, providing essential feedback for the accreditation team in order to help identify areas where AACS is clearly fulfilling its mission as well as point to areas for growth.

As we reflected on our efforts for the day, Michelle Harris, our fourth grade teacher, shared that she has been on accreditation teams in the past, and it has usually not been a very enjoyable experience. However, the way AACS approached our accreditation was entirely different, allowing the teachers to feel good about what they have accomplished and are doing as well as encouraged in areas to grow. Feedback such as this verifies the importance of the collaborative nature of the accreditation process through CSI.

Our last accreditation was in 2018. During the past five years, AACS has been dedicated to working on carrying out the goals which



were developed from that year's self study and verified by the site study team. This year provides the unique experience of completing the last few details on our former plan, while we are assessing ourselves for our next plan. A few of the goals we accomplished through



our last school improvement plan were the creation of our schoolwide learner goals, adopting a formal vision for academic support, and expanding services to meet the needs of all learners.

The next steps for our current accreditation cycle include summarizing the data detailed by the staff in the self study and using that to look for emerging patterns which will lead to our next school improvement goals. A team of Christian educators will conduct the site visit in April 2024 to verify our ratings and look for areas that are going well that are related to our ratings and for areas for improvement. As part of their visit, they will be accrediting our new 9th grade class as well and, with the submission of annual updates, will be accrediting each high school grade as they are added. By the fall of 2026, our hope is that AACS will be officially accredited as a PK-Grade 12 school.

Together, this information will be used to create our final school improvement goals for the next five years. The structure and accountability through Christian Schools International has been key in sharpening our practices and enhancing our desire for continuous improvement. Therefore, a better definition of accreditation as experienced in our partnership with CSI would be "a process by which all faculty and staff work together to measure the mission of their school and create a plan for further growth while being encouraged and called on to continual growth and advancement".
