The Next Chapter is Around the Corner



Thanks to a generous donation, AACS has its first transportation vehicle! This passenger van will transport high school students from our main campus to the high school campus, take teams to athletic events, and help the entire school with other school activities, such as field trips.

As you read this Beacon, the school year has ended, summer has begun, and a new chapter awaits in a couple short months.

First, my hope for everyone reading this is rest. Please allow the more relaxed rhythms of summer to give your entire family a deep. restorative rest to rejuvenate your body and soul. When we are rested, we can better hear and serve God and better hear and care for each other. Even consider not using any technology with you on your vacation. For myself, with a new high school opening, a second daughter going off to college, construction on our main campus, and my parents' planning to move from Boston to be closer to my family, this is one of the busiest summers of my life, but I know rest is critical for me to be an effective and present school leader, husband, father, and son. I am grateful that the school's first

principal, Ann Deckert, will be checking in on me over the summer and holding me accountable to rest.

Second, as we think ahead to the 2023-2024 year, please pray for God's blessing and protection of our school and that He will use AACS for His greater purposes in the broader Ann Arbor area. Here is the link to a beautiful prayer guide that a parent created.



As I shared in the last Beacon, we are in what I would call one of the most historic seasons in the school's 30+ years of existence. This milestone moment is the launch of our high school in August 2023 with our first 9th grade class and the beginning of our journey to become the first Preschool-Grade 12 interdenominational Christian school in Ann Arbor. At the same time, on our main campus, we have begun the construction of two new exciting facilities, the new maker space and an industrial kitchen, with the hopes of their operation by the start of the new school year.

For the coming weeks and months, specific items that could use your praise, prayer, and support include:

Timely completion of the maker space and kitchen on our main campus. It's exciting seeing all of the work underway. Thanks be to God that these projects are finally



underway and off to a great start.

- The hiring of teachers and staff who are passionate about our mission. We still have some key job openings. Thanks be to God for our recent hires.
- The recruitment of 50 ninth graders to join the pioneering first class. This first year will be the hardest year as we seek to make families aware of our new high school. We will open regardless and we are operationally planning for 30, but

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50 is what we are striving for. In fact, we anticipate that there may be students who join in the fall once the new school year begins. Thanks be to God to the nearly 20 students already enrolled and others that are looking and considering.

- Continued high school planning of curriculum, extracurricular programs, student life, spiritual formation, school culture, policies, transportation, and other key areas. Thanks be to God for progress already made, including the amazing donation of a passenger van to AACS.
- We have already raised \$200,000 of the additional \$300,000 needed to help with the high school start-up, so we have \$100,000 to go between now and December. This was largely made possible by God's stirring of a set of supporters who gave \$150,000 and hopes to see the broader AACS community join with them to multiply our collective giving to the school. Thanks be to God for our generous supporters.

While we call on the collective community of AACS to rally together to enable the school to carry out its mission, please also read the article entitled "Prophets of a Future Not Our Own" to bring us back to the Master Builder and His sovereign role in completing all things according to His will. It reminds us that this school and this world belongs to God.

SUPPORT UPDATE: WAYS TO JOIN TOGETHER

Many of you recall our students' Multiplication Project. In that project, the school distributed a total of \$500 to over 125 participating students. In the end, through their creative ideas and hard work, the students raised over \$5,000, which was donated to Shepherd's Foundation, an organization in Ukraine that supports refugee children and their families impacted by the war. That's a 10-fold increase in what was given to them!

Multiplying: One set of friends was inspired by what the students did with their seed money and passionately believes in what God is doing through AACS for the greater Ann Arbor area. As a result, these friends donated an amazing \$150,000 toward our goal of an additional \$300,000 for the start-up of the high school. Their encouragement and challenge to the broader AACS community: Can we do what the students did? - to see our money as a gift from God to be used for His work, trust in God to multiply, and have their gift not just matched but exceeded by the school community. As a school, we are immensely grateful for this significant and generous gift and the opportunity it presents to be multiplied by the AACS community between now and December. Will you join us to more than double this gift?

Planning: In addition, each academic year, the school seeks to raise around \$100,000 in general, undesignated gifts to support the operation of the school. The school intentionally keeps tuition below the actual cost of educating a student to make the school more financially accessible and relies on general giving to balance its budget. With the school's next fiscal year beginning soon in July, please keep us in mind as you plan your giving for the second half of 2023.





Praying: Lastly, there is no dollar amount to this, but this is one of the most meaningful ways to support AACS. Its value is priceless. We are doubling down on the need for prayer during this season - for provision and protection for all of AACS. One way to pray is to sign up for our prayer calendar through August. We accomplish in our lifetime only a tiny fraction of the magnificent enterprise that is God's work. Nothing we do is complete, which is a way of saying that the Kingdom always lies beyond us.

No statement says all that could be said.

No prayer fully expresses our faith.

No confession brings perfection.

No pastoral visit brings wholeness.

No program accomplishes the church's mission.

No set of goals and objectives includes everything.

This is what we are about.

We plant the seeds that one day will grow.

We provide yeast that produces far beyond our capabilities.

We cannot do everything, and there is a sense of liberation in realizing that.

The mission of AACS Theater Club is to provide students an outlet to use and grow their God-given gifts and talents. Students are coached on how to be creative and expressive within their role, but that is not all. Students are also busy working on their spiritual growth. During *Seussical* rehearsals, Director Abbie-Jo Wilcox shared devotions that matched themes from the musical. These included the topic of kindness and how it is not always easy to be kind, fulfilling the role that God created especially for you and being the person God created you to be, and sharing the Good News, even when others belittle you for it. These topics challenged students to think about and discuss how faith relates to everything they do, including a musical.

Students also developed other skills, such as leadership and encouragement. Older students help younger students, providing opportunities to develop leadership skills. Cast members encourage one another through the use of "shout-outs", which are positive comments meant to celebrate and build one another up, to fellow cast or crew members.

Award Winning Artist and Author Visits AACS

As part of our annual reading month celebration in March, Ann Arbor Christian School students were treated to a special visit by author and artist. Richard Schlatter, Richard's visit was made possible through funding provided by AACS alumni family Bill and Lorri Vander Roest. During Richard's visit to the school, he spoke to students in grades 1-4 and shared his book, "The Old Man and the Tree." Students were delighted with this beautiful tale of loyalty and respect and learned how to apply the message to their friends. nature, and themselves. In addition to the charming story, students were fascinated with the drafts Richard shared as he told how he wrote the book and created the illustrations. Students were amazed with the transformation from his first penciled thumbnail sketches to the final beautifully colored pictures. The second graders, who were creating their own mystery stories at the time of the visit, were able to relate to the steps in the writing process and share their own process back with Mr. Schaltter.

At the end of the book presentation, Richard led the groups through the "Old Man's Pledge". This helped students make the connection between the story and their own friendships. They repeated with Richard, "I will not cut down my friends." Finally, students were presented with their own copy of the book, personally signed by Richard Schlatter. This program was a wonderful way to connect with our school's biblical worldview through Richard's example of using and sharing his gifts to make the world a better place, as well as discussing the ideas of stewardship and caring for nature and protecting and caring for our friendships. As students read and re-read their books, these lessons and experiences will be remembered and reinforced in their lives and hearts.

The next day, Richard returned to AACS and spoke with the fifth through eighth grade students about another one of his projects, his ArtPrize piece "A. Lincoln", a large two-dimensional work of art made entirely of pennies. Based in Grand Rapids, ArtPrize is one of the largest art competitions and festivals in the world open to the general public to participate in. Richard's "A. Lincoln" won the 2017 2D entry in ArtPrize, as well as winning the overall public vote grand prize.

Not only were the students amazed by the description of how Richard created the 12-foot-tall portrait of the 16th president from more than 24,000 pennies, but he also shared his admiration and respect for President Lincoln. "Especially today we need the message of Lincoln. He was one of the greatest presidents, if not the



greatest president," stated Richard who is passionate about sharing his knowledge of Lincoln with youngsters. Listening to Richard was an inspiration to the students. His gentle and

humble manner spoke volumes to the students about using the

gifts you have been given, as well as working with perseverance and completing challenging tasks.

In addition to these projects, Richard owns a graphic design firm where he works as an independent graphic design consultant. He also gives his educational presentation to local schools in the Battle Creek area where he lives. Richard greatly enjoyed his visit to Ann Arbor Christian School and noted how warm and welcoming the students and staff were, as well as the positive atmosphere and how attentive the students were. AACS was blessed to have this opportunity to have Richard visit our school and the generosity of Bill and Lorri Vander Roest in sponsoring this event.

"It is with mixed emotions that I contemplate retiring this summer after 29 years as a staff member at AACS. My husband Dave and I have been



members of the Christian School Association of Ann Arbor since it was formed in 1986 to pursue opening a non-denominational Christian School in Ann Arbor. We recall long board meetings, fundraising projects, the search for property, planning the curriculum, etc. By God's grace, the school opened in the Fall of 1991. In 1994, when our young-

est son was in 1st grade, I was asked to volunteer part time in the school office to support our first teacher, Vic Luchies. Soon after, this became a paying job. When Ann Deckert was hired as the first full time principal, the two of us shared a very small office in one of the modular classrooms of our original facility.

When the school moved to our current facility in 2003 and Cheri Lubbers was hired as office manager, my responsibilities shifted to focus on financial and human resources concerns, which of course have grown along with the school. It's amazing to think that our current staff of 35+ is larger than the student body was when I started! While not part of my job, it has also been a joy to assist with the musical activities of the school over the years by playing the piano for special events, such as opening and closing chapels, Grandparents' Day, Christmas and Spring Programs, the 4th grade (now 3rd grade) Michigan play, and 8th grade graduation.

Dave and I continue to be amazed at the ways God has blessed AACS and brought it from a dream to the flourishing, growing school that it is today. I have been blessed to work with a school community of staff and families who love Jesus and care for one another. I will truly miss AACS, but this special place will always remain in our hearts and prayers. As Dave and I and the school transition to new chapters, it is our prayer that God's grace will be showered upon us all."

"When I walked into Ann Arbor Christian School for my interview in July 2015, I knew it was a place I wanted to be. There was an overwhelming feeling that this was someplace special, and, when Wayne called to offer

me the job, my answer was an immediate "Yes!" I started work on my new classroom immediately and started getting to know my colleagues. After I settled into the school year, and then the next school year, and the next, it felt like home, and the people I met became my family. My faith grew. The



people I taught alongside cared about me, and prayed with me, encouraged me. I grew professionally and learned more about being a teacher at AACS than all my previous 20 years in education. I could not imagine teaching

anywhere else. In fact, I was convinced that my teaching career would end if I could not teach at AACS.

However, no doors for any other profession opened, only teaching. Maybe, just maybe my career as a teacher wasn't over. Maybe God wanted me to take what I had learned here to someplace else. As soon as I wrapped my head around those ideas and that the plans God had for me were "plans to prosper [me] and not to harm [me], plans to give [me] hope and a future," everything fell into place with a new teaching job. I have packed up my classroom with the help of my amazing colleagues, one of whom was on the committee that interviewed me and am ready for this next chapter in my life. Thank you for the opportunity to work with you, teach your children, and be a part of this wonderful community. It has been an honor and a privilege to teach at Ann Arbor Christian School, and I will miss it more than words can say. But I also know that God has wonderful things in store for all of us!"


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RISING 9TH GRADER: JOEY SPASOVSKI
