In the last issue of the Beacon, I wrote about Ann Arbor Christian School's process of writing a new five-year strategic plan over this summer. The plan focuses on the five strategic areas that the school's leadership has prioritized: addressing facilities needs, retaining and recruiting high-quality teachers, strengthening fundraising efforts, growing our ability to increase student support needs, and building more intentional relationships with like-minded and like-valued partners in the community. In addition to the strategic plan, our recent re-accreditation with Christian Schools International generated its own school improvement plan that will advise some of the school's direction in the next five years. In both cases, the plans are meant to advance our mission and core values into the future.

We will use our God-given gifts and resources to develop these plans to the best of our ability, but in the end, it is not our plans but the Lord's will that we seek for Ann Arbor Christian School. It

is not by our own might or power, but by the Spirit of the Lord that we will grow and thrive. We need to trust in God to define what is good for us rather than our own human metrics and ideals. As new plans begin to take shape for the school, we can trust Many are the plans in a person's heart, but it is the Lord's purpose that prevails.

Celebrating a Successful Re-accreditation

Thanks be to God! I am delighted to share that after a three-day visit to our two campuses in April, the Christian Schools International (CSI) accreditation site team unanimously and enthusiastically voted to recommend that the entirety of Ann Arbor Christian School, including our new grade 9, be accredited with CSI. As standard procedure, their report and recommendation will be sent to the CSI Accreditation Commission this summer for formal approval. This marks our fourth successful accreditation cycle with CSI, and we remain grateful for the partnership with them as well as the other CSI schools throughout the state of Michigan.



While site team members do not need to be affiliated with CSI schools, most generally are. Members of our seven-person site team came from the following CSI schools: Holland Christian Schools (PK-12), Lansing Christian School (PK-12), The Potter's House School (PK-12), and Zeeland Christian School (PK-8). The 7th member of the team was Bob Ause, a long-term AACS substitute teacher for 8th grade science last year and the recently retired science department chair from Greenhills School (6-12) located in Ann Arbor. The site team chair came to us directly from CSI as our regional accreditation coordinator for this and future accreditation cycles. This was an amazing site team who was passionate about Christian education, intelligent, insightful and brought a broad skill set and expertise. In addition, they were a fun loving group that added a lot of joy to our staff.

This particular accreditation cycle was different from previous cycles because of the inclusion of our new high school. The high school was highlighted several times by the team for the great work already done and work that is in progress, the quality of the start-up space at Grace Ann Arbor North Church, the spirit at the upper campus, the commitment of the families who joined, and the wonderful group of teachers who make up our pioneering staff. Over the next few years, AACS will submit updated high school curriculum materials yearly to CSI as part of our annual reporting. However, the high school already enjoys the same accreditation status as the rest of AACS. This means our first seniors applying to college in the fall of 2026 will be doing so from an accredited high school.

Another exciting opportunity for AACS, in addition to our CSI accreditation, is the submission for dual accreditation with Cognia (formerly AdvancedEd), a leading accreditation organization for private schools across the country. This opportunity is due to a reciprocity arrangement they have with CSI. The additional accreditation will boost the credibility status of AACS as we prepare to graduate high schoolers in 2027.



Thank you for your prayers and support during our accreditation cycle. I would like to give a special thanks to Renee McKeone for chairing the process on the school's end. Let's all give thanks together to our God for reaching another major milestone for AACS.

On April 8th, students at Ann Arbor Christian School had a once in a lifetime opportunity to experience this glory in an amazing way. The path of the 2024 total eclipse fell just outside of our state, with only one small section of southeastern Michigan falling in the path of totality. At 99% of totality, we knew students would benefit from experiencing this incredible phenomenon. However, middle school science teacher Mary Wiland recognized that 99% totality was also not 100% totality. She could not pass up the opportunity to take her seventh grade earth science students to Toledo, Ohio, which was in the path of 100% totality for this once in a lifetime experience.

With six adventurous parent chaperones, a zealous science teacher, the building principal, and 24 excited seventh graders, the group left Michigan around 9:00 AM to head toward Ohio. No one knew exactly what to expect in the way of traffic or if the selected viewing area would still have parking when we arrived, but we headed south with anticipation regardless. Along the way, the group stopped at Maumee Bay State Park and Magee Marsh along Lake Erie.

Around 2:00 PM, the group first started looking at the sun through their eclipse glasses. Students observed the changes in their view of the sun as the moon's shadow began covering

the sun from the first contact of the partial eclipse. We heard students calling out, "Wow! That is so cool!" and "Look at that! It looks like just a bite is taken out of the sun!" Making these observations first hand made earth science truly come to life!



In the final minutes before totality, the students were gathered to sit and watch. An awe fell over the group as we watched the sky change and as the horizon turned a sunset shade of pink and orange, and we felt the temperature begin to fall as the total eclipse began. Someone started a countdown, and our voices joined theirs in counting down the seconds to totality. Everyone spontaneously cheered. As the moon had now completely covered the sun, we were able to remove our eclipse glasses. The few minutes seemed to stretch out

A Once in Lifetime Experience

as we took in the experience, gazing at the beautiful sights of the glow of the corona, Bailey's Beads, a circle of bright lights around the moon and listening to the sounds in the marsh. While many birds and animals quiet down during a total eclipse, we had a very different experience in the marsh. The nighttime insects and frogs began to sing quite loudly, filling the air with their voices. Everyone, young and old, soaked in the moment, gazing at the amazing beauty and taking in the awesome precision of our God who orchestrated these celestial movements. All too soon, the "diamond ring" appeared, a gorgeous bright light signaling that the total eclipse was ending as the moon's shadow pulled away. We put our glasses back on, and suddenly it was light again. Totality was over, and the moon's shadow moved on through the phase of third contact. It was bright outside, the frogs and insects stopped singing, and the eclipse was over. Many students exclaimed that it was an unforgettable experience. One student even shared that it was the most beautiful thing he had ever seen.

Meanwhile, back in Ann Arbor, at 2:45 PM, parents were invited to pick up their children and head to the field with solar glasses to observe the partial eclipse. While not totality, it was still an amazing opportunity for students. The view in Ann Arbor with 99% of the sun covered was quite a sight to behold!

Experiences such as these are what sets Ann Arbor Christian School apart: teachers who go above and beyond to plan events that inspire "engaged learners" with first-hand experiences in science, but also develop "rooted Christ followers" as we look to the author of creation.

There will not be another total solar eclipse near Michigan until 2099, which makes this truly once in a lifetime experience for many members of our community!

As I face retiring from Ann Arbor Christian School after 30 years, I have a mixture of emotions: gratitude, grief, joy, sadness, worry, and anticipation. The sadness and grief are evidence of how important this place has been in my life, and the loss I will experience as I leave a job that was so much more than a job. It was a calling, a vocation, and a ministry. I will miss my colleagues, the students, the families, and the sense of mission and purpose.

Looking back over the past 30 years, I am also filled with gratitude. Gratitude for a school that encouraged me to use

my gifts and challenged me to grow. Gratitude for God's sustaining grace during those early years when I was creating integrated curriculum and doing experiments late at night before trying them out with the students! Gratitude for the support my own parents provided during my career. Gratitude for the kindness of families who blessed me with



meals, gifts, and words of encouragement!

What aspects of AACS caused me to stay for 30 years? I love that AACS is an interdenominational school! This school would not have existed 100 years ago. It is no small miracle that people from over 40 different churches and many different denominations (Christian Reformed to Lutheran to Catholic to non-denominational) are able to work together in love and unity to fulfill the mission of Ann Arbor Christian School. My faith has been enriched by working closely with my brothers and sisters from other churches.

The integrated, hands-on curriculum that appeals to a variety of learners has been another reason I have loved working at AACS. Teachers have sought to make connections between subject areas through the lens of a biblical worldview. Helping students connect all of life to God is vital. Bible class is not simply an isolated subject, but encourages faith to be woven into all aspects of curriculum and day-to-day life at AACS.

Finally, I have deeply appreciated the community aspect of life at AACS. From teachers eating and praying together, to parents volunteering in so many areas of the school, to prayer gatherings when there is a need, the strong sense of a loving community is palpable when people walk into the building. I am so grateful for the deep friendships I have made over my years at AACS.

Years ago, I read a book which described the decline of many Christian schools and institutions over the course of our country's history. The author suggested that the change happened when the focus shifted from being Christ-centered to being academically excellent and successful. These two things should not be mutually exclusive. I am grateful for our school leadership's commitment to keep Christ at the center of all that we do. Dedicating resources for the Spiritual Life Coordinator position was one way that the school demonstrated that commitment. It has been such a privilege to not only teach in the classroom for 23 years but to also serve as the Spiritual Life Coordinator for 13 years.

In my 30 years on staff at AACS I have seen the school grow from four classrooms to a preschool-grade 10 school. I have seen it grow from modular classrooms to our current main campus building and to launching a high school. I have witnessed the development of sports programs and other extracurricular activities. Throughout my 30 years the mission has remained the same: to offer a Christ-centered, academically excellent education that challenges students to live and act in society as committed followers of Jesus Christ.

As I anticipate the end of my formal time at AACS, my prayer is that each member of the school community will continue to guard and protect what the Lord has given. As Paul wrote in 2 Timothy 1:13-14, "What you heard from me, keep as the pattern of sound teaching, with faith and love in Christ Jesus. Guard the good deposit that was entrusted to you—guard it with the help of the Holy Spirit who lives in us." This means faithfully praying for the school and for our school community and working through conflicts in a way that honors the Lord. This means staying faithful to God's Word and relying on the Holy Spirit as we continue to strategize for the school of the future.

Reflecting on endings and beginnings, I have been comforted by the final "I AM" statement made by Jesus in the book of Revelation. I am the Alpha and the Omega, the First and the Last, the Beginning and the End. All of our own beginnings and endings are encompassed by Jesus, The Beginning and The End. He has already gone before us. Therefore, we don't need to fear our own endings and beginnings, but we can entrust ourselves to the one who holds all endings and beginnings in His Hand.
